

Oren Alexander Accuses Miami Prosecutors of Hiding Evidence as Brothers Face Federal Sex-Trafficking Case

Attorneys for jailed Miami real estate developer Oren Alexander, co-founder of the luxury brokerage "The Alexander Team," have accused Miami Dade prosecutors of concealing critical digital evidence in his ongoing sexual assault case, calling the omission a "textbook Brady violation." In Florida state court, Alexander faces sexual battery charges stemming from a 2023 incident in Miami Beach. Prosecutors allege he assaulted a woman before a night out at LIV nightclub, while Alexander maintains the encounter was consensual.

In a renewed motion to compel discovery filed this week, defense lawyers say the State obtained the alleged victim's full iCloud data under a search warrant nearly a year ago but disclosed only selective portions to the defense. The withheld files allegedly include photos showing the woman "dancing, smiling and appearing carefree at LIV Nightclub hours after the night she now claims she was raped."

The filing says Alexander's team located the images independently and confronted the woman during a deposition. She reportedly admitted that prosecutors and her attorney had reviewed those same photos a week earlier yet failed to turn them

over to the defense. The motion argues the State's conduct "strikes at the heart of due-process fairness" and asks the court to order the immediate production of the full iCloud dataset.

Citing *Brady v. Maryland*, the defense wrote, "When in the history of criminal jurisprudence has the defense had to beg for an iCloud search the State itself obtained to prove guilt?" The motion also references prior rulings by Judge Lody Jean, who in a separate Miami case, found that similar 'post-incident' nightclub footage was "at least relevant, if not more important than that." Oren Alexander's attorney's Edward J. O'Donnell IV and Joel Denaro told *Los Angeles* exclusively, "Two of the three Florida accusers have admitted they were partying at LIV nightclub just hours after the alleged assaults – a fact they hid from detectives and prosecutors. The third, now in Costa Rica, told friends she isn't pursuing charges, yet prosecutors are blocking her deposition. All three were in contact with New York attorney Evan Torgan before charges were filed. These cases rest only on years-old claims and are a disgrace."

The state discovery issue unfolds amid wider legal troubles for Oren and his brothers, known as simply, "The Alexander Brothers," in the Southern District of New York. Oren, along with brothers Alon and Tal, all face parallel criminal charges in federal court as the three are charged with sex trafficking and other related offenses. A joint letter filed October 30th by the Alexander Brothers' attorney Marc Agnifilo, to Judge Valerie Caproni, shows both sides are preparing for trial logistics, debating the use of a jury questionnaire and requesting an earlier status conference before the December 22nd hearing.

Oren, Alon and Tal Alexander rose to prominence selling luxury properties in Miami, New York, and the Hamptons, often catering to celebrity clients. All three are currently housed at the Metropolitan Detention Facility in Brooklyn, NY, as they await their January 2026 trial date.
